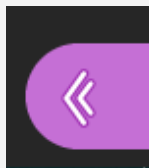

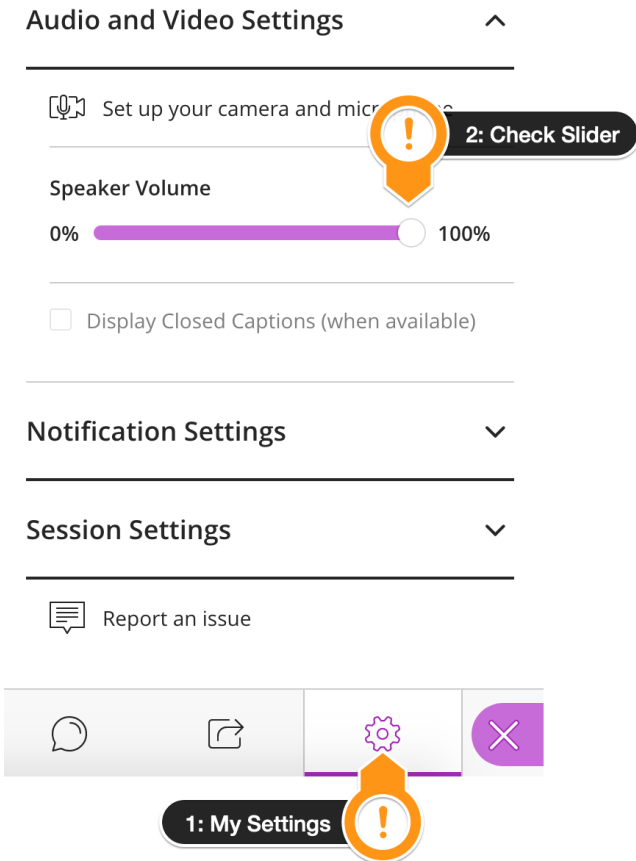

What are Discussions?

- The Discussion Board provides an opportunity for instructors to interact with students and students to interact with each other through conversations.
- Discussions can take place of those conversations that are normally had in a traditional classroom.
- Discussions provide the advantage of asynchronous communication.

How are Discussions used?

- Instructors post questions on a course discussion board, which students respond to
- Instructors have students post their work to a discussion board so other students can see it
- Students post reading responses to a discussion board

Parts of a Discussion

- Forums "Discussion Topics" - This is how the discussion board is categorized.
 - Typically created by the instructor
- Threads "Conversations" – Students create and reply to threads within the forum.
 - Created by instructors and students
- Posts - Threads and any replies others make to a thread.

Discussion Board Examples

- **Introductions** – In an online environment, it is important for everyone to get to know each other. An Introductions forum is a great place for everyone to get to know each other.
- **Class Debate** – students post comments on a reading to start a debate.
- **Peer Review** - Students post their work and peers in the course can “reply” to their thread, offering their suggestions and comments.
- **Ask the Instructor** – Students can ask general questions about homework assignments, readings, and course content.
 - Students can help each other out by answering each other’s questions.
 - Instructors should monitor the forum to answer questions and correct any misconceptions that may have been provided by other students.
 - Subscribe to be notified when a student posts to the forum.

Facilitating Online Discussions (1)

- Design questions that provoke critical thinking
 - Closed Questions limit expression, often answered by repeating information found in a textbook, and constrain students to think in terms of right and wrong answers.
 - Open Questions allow for expression, multiple answers or solutions and for the exploration of the unknown.
- Establish ground rules and provide a rubric to establish the criteria for the discussion (e.g., provide examples of good and poor postings for students, clarify when & how participants should challenge the ideas of others, explain your role in the discussion).
- Introduce the discussion with a prompt that lets the students understand your expectations, their role in the discussion and the basis for the discussion (e.g., readings, in-class discussion, lecture material, personal opinion, new resources).

Facilitating Online Discussions (2)

- Consider periodically responding to individual postings or main themes in the discussion to emphasize the value of the discussion and help students to retain interest in the discussion.
- Pause for student self-discovery and peer interaction. Don't always jump in with the "right" answer as this can shut down student conversations and exploration.
- Discussion questions that have only one answer belong in a multiple choice test, not discussion.

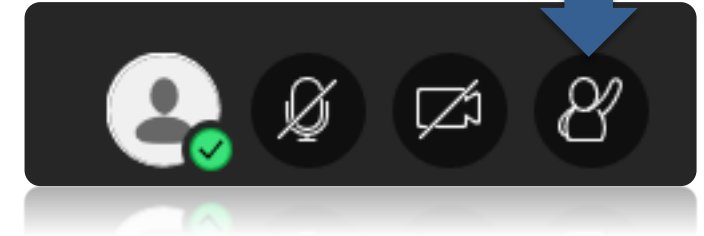
